

AGR Professionals Program

Exciting things are happening at Alpha Zeta and without question our fraternity's greatest resource is its members, both alumni and active. With that in mind, the Alpha Zeta Alumni Board has developed a program to utilize our greatest resource to everyone's benefit. The AGR Professionals Program is designed with five major goals: 1) Increase undergraduate investment and commitment to AGR, 2) Increase undergraduate access to career guidance and industry opportunities, 3) Increase alumni employer awareness of available employee candidates, 4) Give alumni employers the opportunity to evaluate upper echelon employment candidates, and 5) Give AGR members opportunities not available to nonmembers. The goal of the Alumni Board is to serve enough alumni involvement to provide a mentor to each in-house active member. Active members will have the opportunity to participate in two the program, career mentoring employee/employer connections. The career mentoring will pair an alumnus with an active member who is pursuing a similar career or desires to work in a similar industry. The

relationship would be loosely structured to provide maximum flexibility to the two individuals. The goals of career mentoring are to provide hands-on career/industry exposure to the undergraduate, give the alumnus an opportunity to evaluate the undergraduate for potential employment recommendations, and provide career advice and industry insight to the undergraduate. The employee/ employer connections program would aim to connect upper echelon undergraduate members with potential alumni employers, and provide alumni employers with first access to these top tier candidates. Other program features may be added as it becomes more established. Participation in the program is voluntary for both alumni and active members. Adopt-A-Highway Project

Community service is a big part of the Alpha Zeta Chapter of Alpha Gamma Rho. In the recent past, we have improved our community service effort. Dave Sewell Memorial Sell-A-Fella


